## ACTION ALERT from the Executive Director

The National Park Service has re-opened the comment period for its [Proposed Rulemaking on Hunting and Trapping in National Preserves in Alaska](#). Comments are due no later than February 15, 2015. If you missed the comment deadline in December, please take this opportunity to comment on the rulemaking. Even if you already submitted comments, this re-opened comment period provides an opportunity to supplement the comments you submitted, correct any misapprehensions, learn more about the issues and provide insights, describe additional observations, or simply to restate your concerns or support in a different way.

This re-opened comment period is in addition to the open comment period on the [2015 Compendium](#), which also closes on February 15, 2015. The 2015 Compendium will include wildlife closures being proposed in the rulemaking; it is important to note that TWO comment opportunities are being provided - one regarding the closures as they appear in the compendia and one for having those closures become permanent through rulemaking.

Science Technical Advisory Panel to  
Meet**

The North Slope Science Initiative (NSSI) Science Technical Advisory Panel (STAP) will meet Jan. 26-28 in Barrow at the Inupiat Heritage Center, 5421 North Star Blvd. The meetings will begin at 1 p.m. on Jan. 26 and at 9 a.m. Jan. 27 and 28, with public comment scheduled for 3-4 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 27.

The NSSI is an intergovernmental effort to increase collaboration on the science needed to make informed decisions related to development and environmental change on Alaska's North Slope and its adjacent seas. The STAP provides advice and recommendations to NSSI on information priorities.

The meeting agenda will include discussions of the North Slope Scenarios Project and a long-term monitoring strategy for the North Slope.

## Sealaska Land Entitlement Finalization

In December 2014, Congress passed legislation that finalized the remaining Sealaska allotment under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act, or ANCSA, enabling the conveyance of 18 parcels in Southeast Alaska.

ANCSA, enacted by Congress in December 1971, to finalize Alaska Native land claims and make way for the development of the trans-Alaska oil pipeline. Rather than establish Indian reservations, ANCSA created a system of village and regional corporations owned by Native shareholders and granted them rights to nearly 44 million acres of federal lands and a billion dollars. Lands around Native villages were withdrawn so that Native Corporations could select lands traditionally used by Alaska Natives. The Bureau of Land Management has conveyed approximately 293,000 acres of land to Sealaska Corporation, leaving a remaining entitlement of up to 70,075 acres.

## USFWS Announces 12-Month Finding on Petition to List Yellow-billed Loon

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service announced a determination that listing the yellow-billed loon as threatened or endangered under the Endangered Species Act is not necessary at this time.

There are two primary reasons we have now determined that listing the yellow-billed loon is "not warranted" in contrast to our earlier determination. First, following the 2009 finding, the Service and its partners expanded efforts to better understand yellow-billed loon

## More information on the 2015 Superintendent's Compendiums Alaska

National Park Service compendiums for Alaska will be open for a 30-day public comment period, from January 15 to February 15, 2015. A compendium - one for each NPS area in Alaska - is a compilation of all designations, closures and restrictions adopted under the discretionary authority within the regulations covering national parks. This regulatory tool helps manage Alaska's national park areas for the public's enjoyment, use and protection.

Only a handful of changes are proposed in this year's compendiums. These include:

- A prohibition on the use or possession of domestic goats, sheep, llamas, alpacas or related animals, which are sometimes used for packing or as pets. Wildlife biologists have found there is a significant risk of disease transmission from these domestic species to Alaska's Dall's sheep, mountain goat and other ungulate populations.

- A prohibition on the use of bicycles in the Valley of 10,000 Smokes in Katmai National Park due to the potential damage of sensitive soils that are home to cyanobacteria, lichens and mosses.

- Several national preserves are incorporating temporary wildlife sport hunting restrictions into their compendiums. These are generally identical to provisions in earlier compendiums.

NPS units which are proposing restrictions on sport hunting in national preserves will hold open houses on a wide range of topics; incorporated into those meetings will be a public hearing where participants can comment on the proposed sport hunting restrictions. 

## BLM Alaska Opens Public Comment on Proposed Areas of Critical Environmental Concern in the Eastern Interior Resource Management Plan/Environmental Impact Statement

Based on public comment on the Eastern Interior Draft Resource Management Plan (RMP)/Draft Environmental Impact Statement, the Bureau of Land Management is considering changing the boundary of the proposed Fortymile Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC) and designating a new ACEC on the Mosquito Flats, also in the Fortymile region.

The proposed Mosquito Flats ACEC (30,000 acres) provides unique wetland and aquatic habitats and supports a variety of wildlife species. Mosquito Flats is an important moose calving area and summer habitat for the regional moose population. The area also supports short-eared owls and nesting trumpeter swans. The proposed ACEC would be recommended to be closed to new mineral entry and leasing. Off-highway vehicles (OHVs) would be limited by season with no summer use allowed except by permit.

The Fortymile ACEC (685,000 acres) boundary presented in the Alternatives of the draft RMP/EIS was reconfigured to improve manageability and maintain effective caribou and

Dall sheep habitat and mineral licks. The ACEC would be recommended to be closed to new mineral entry and leasing and to have a limited OHV designation with seasonal limitations on uses within one mile of mineral licks.

A 60-day public comment period for the proposed ACECs began on January 3, 2015. The public is invited to provide comments related to the new ACECs. Comments may be submitted using any of the following methods:

## Secretary Jewell Issued a Decision in Late 2014 regarding Izembek National Wildlife Refuge Land Exchange and Road Proposal

As directed by Congress in the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009, Secretary of the Interior Sally Jewell concluded a four-year analysis, and issued a decision supporting the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's preferred alternative to decline a proposed land exchange with the State of Alaska and prevent construction of a road through the Izembek National Wildlife Refuge.

The nearly four-year analysis on the effects of the proposed land exchange, including the impact a road would have on Izembek's vital ecology and congressionally-designated wilderness helped to inform the Secretary's decision. In addition, a personal visit to the Refuge and the King Cove and Cold Bay communities as well as a report from the Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs regarding the medical evacuation benefits of the proposed road were considered.

To complete the environmental impact assessment, the Service conducted a public process that included over 130 meetings with stakeholders, government-to-government consultations, and numerous trips to King Cove by Service and Department of the Interior officials.

"We've undertaken a robust and transparent public process to review the matter from all sides, and I have personally visited the Refuge and met with the King Cove and Cold Bay communities to gain a

better understanding of their concerns," said Jewell. "After careful consideration, I support the Service's conclusion that building a road through the Refuge would cause irreversible damage not only to the Refuge itself, but to the wildlife that depend on it. Izembek is an extraordinary place – internationally recognized as vital to a rich diversity of species – and we owe it to future generations to think about long-term solutions that do not insert a road through the middle of this Refuge and designated wilderness. I understand the need for reliable methods of medical transport from King Cove, but I have concluded that other methods of transport remain that could be improved to meet community needs."

Given the serious concerns raised by King Cove residents, the Secretary reiterated the Department's commitment to assist in identifying and evaluating options that would improve access to affordable transportation and health care for the citizens of this remote Alaska community. She noted that nothing in the decision precludes the State of Alaska, the Aleutians East Borough, or the communities of King Cove and Cold Bay from implementing another alternative for transportation improvements outside of the Refuge, including

enhancements to the dock at Cold Bay. "We will continue to work with the State of Alaska and local communities to support viable alternatives to ensure continued transportation and infrastructure improvements for the health and safety of King Cove residents," added Jewell.

The Service issued the final EIS for public review on February 6, 2013. On March 21, 2013, then-Secretary of the Interior Ken Salazar directed that two actions be completed before any final decision:

- 1) the Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs visit King Cove and hold additional government-to-government consultations to assess the medical evacuation benefits from the proposed road, and provide a report to the Secretary; and
- 2) the Secretary of the Interior hold an official meeting in King Cove.
