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Office of History and Archaeology news

Office of History and Archaeology is hosting the second of the 2023 Education Series on April 27, 1pm- 3pm, "Archaeological Field Methods: Avoiding Common Red Flags for a More Effective Survey" presented by OHA archaeologist Dr. Nick Schmuck. Registration is required! This presentation by Special Projects Archaeologist Nick Schmuck will be a back-to-basics of planning your field survey for a State Cultural Resources Investigation Permit (SCRIP), highlighting common methodological gaps and weaknesses that crop up in SCRIP applications, and the standard of work that OHA expects from field surveys conducted on state lands. Expect tips and tricks for pre-field planning, how to identify land managing agencies for your project area, and meeting regional challenges to fieldwork in Alaska. Maritime Heritage Program Grant award.

The Alaska SHPO received notice that it has received a National Maritime Heritage Grants funding for education and preservation projects. Details of the Alaska Maritime Heritage Program will follow once the grant is set up with NPS. The national program is designed to preserve historic maritime resources and to increase public awareness and appreciation for the maritime heritage of the United States. The grant is funded through a percentage of the proceeds from the sale or scrapping of obsolete vessels of the National Defense Reserve Fleet.

Federal Legislation news

Congress passed the omnibus spending bill on December 23rd, appropriating \$204,515,000 for the Historic Preservation Fund for Fiscal Year 2023. HPF funding includes State Historic Preservation Offices \$62.15 million (increase of \$4.475 million), Tribes \$23 million (increase of \$7 million), Underrepresented communities grants \$1.2 million, Paul Bruhn Historic Revitalization grants \$12.5 million, African American Civil Rights grants \$24 million, History of Equal Rights grants \$5 million, Save American Treasures \$26.5 million, 250th Anniversary grants \$10 million, and Congressionally Directed HPF projects \$29 million.

On December 21, 2022, President Biden signed into law the Safeguard Tribal Objects of Patrimony (STOP) Act (S. 1471/H.R. 2930). This bipartisan, bicameral legislation strengthens laws aimed at preventing trafficking in Native American cultural items and facilitates the voluntary return of sacred and cultural objects.

Department of Interior news

During the 2022 White House Tribal Nations Summit, the Departments of the Interior, Agriculture, and Commerce outlined a series of new steps to increase and strengthen Tribal participation in the management and stewardship of federal lands and waters. Since Secretary Deb Haaland and Secretary Tom Vilsack signed Joint Secretary's Order 3403 in 2021 committing to Tribal and federal co-stewardship of federal lands, waters and wildlife, the Interior Department and Forest Service have signed over 20 new co-stewardship agreements with Tribes,

Alaska Native Corporations and consortiums, with more than 60 additional agreements under various stages of review.

National Park Service news

Bulletin 38 Traditional Cultural Places

National Park Service has published a revised Bulletin 38 (Traditional Cultural Places) and is inviting comments through April 30, 2023.

NPS Grant opportunities:

The <u>State, Tribal, Local, Plans & Grants Division</u> is now accepting applications for the <u>Underrepresented Communities Grant Program</u>. Before applying, please make sure that you have read and understand the limitations of each funding program and have carefully reviewed the <u>Notice of Funding Opportunity</u>. The Notice of Funding Opportunity contains all the information you will need to create a successful application.

Congress has appropriated \$1.25 million for the Underrepresented Communities Grant Program (URC) for FY 2023. The URC Grant Program supports the survey, inventory, and designation of historic properties that are associated with communities currently underrepresented in the National Register of Historic Places and among National Historic Landmarks.

Eligible applicants include: State Historic Preservation Offices; Federally Recognized Indian Tribes, Alaska Native Villages/Corporations, Native Hawaiian Organizations, as defined by 54 USC 300309, 54 USC 300313, and 54 USC 300314; and, Certified Local Governments, non-profit entities.

The <u>State</u>, <u>Tribal</u>, <u>Local</u>, <u>Plans & Grants Division</u> is now accepting applications for the <u>History of Equal Rights (HER)</u> grant program. Before applying, please make sure that you have read and understand the limitations of each funding program and have carefully reviewed the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). The Notice of Funding Opportunity contains all the information you will need to create a successful application. Congress has appropriated **\$5 million** for the HER program. Grant projects fund physical preservation or pre-preservation of sites associated with efforts to achieve equal rights. The History of Equal Rights grants are not limited to any specific group and are intended to include the broadest possible interpretation of equal rights for any American.

Advisory Council on Historic Preservation news

The U.S. Senate voted by unanimous consent on December 22, 2022, to confirm Professor Sara C. Bronin of Connecticut as chairman of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), following her nomination by President Joe Biden. Once sworn in, Bronin will lead the ACHP. The agency has operated under the oversight of its vice chairman, Jordan Tannenbaum, since June 2021.

"I am grateful to President Biden and the Senate for the incredible opportunity to lead the ACHP," Bronin said. "Historic, tribal, and cultural resources connect us with our past, while offering a chance to shape our future. That is why preservationists must engage in current debates about energy policy, climate resilience, housing development, transportation infrastructure, tribal sovereignty, and the tax system.

"As chair, I hope to work with the agency's experienced and knowledgeable staff to continue the ACHP's involvement in these key issues, bringing a spirit of innovation, a commitment to inclusion, and a sense of deep responsibility to generations to come." Bronin is a Mexican American architect, attorney, and policymaker specializing in historic preservation, property, land use, and climate change. She is a tenured professor at Cornell University, with appointments in the Department of City and Regional Planning, the

Rubacha Department of Real Estate, the Cornell Law School, and the Department of Architecture, and she is a Fellow of the Atkinson Center for Sustainability. Among her scholarly projects, she founded and directs the National Zoning Atlas, a multi-institutional effort to unlock research on the approximately 30,000 zoning codes that shape the American economy and society.

Active in public service, Bronin chaired Preservation Connecticut, served on the board of Latinos in Heritage Conservation, and served as an advisor for the National Trust for Historic Preservation. She also founded Desegregate Connecticut, led an award-winning overhaul of Hartford's zoning code, and served as an advisor for the Sustainable Development Code. Bronin holds degrees from the University of Texas, University of Oxford, and Yale Law School. The chair serves a term concurrent with the term of the sitting President.

Updated Policy

The ACHP is providing updated advice to all federal agencies for the development of unanticipated discovery stipulations in Section 106 agreements when burial sites, human remains or funerary objects could be encountered during the implementation of an undertaking, "Policy Statement on Burial Sites, Human Remains, and Funerary Objects." The policy advances 13 principles, with the main guiding principle that burial sites, human remains, and funerary objects should be treated with dignity and respect in all circumstances including, but not limited to, all times in consultation, during field surveys, when handling must occur, in documenting and/or reporting, if treatment actions occur, and in all other forms of interaction.

The ACHP's Preserve the Past, Build for the Future webinar series is back in 2023. The series is geared toward college students and those interested in historic preservation. National Trust Preservation Funds Grant Program: Accepting Applications

The next round of the National Preservation Fund is now open. Enhance your efforts to save the historic places within our community—participate in the National Trust Preservation Funds grant program. This annual program supports local preservation organizations' efforts to **preserve and protect** important places in their communities.

Funding ranges from \$2,500 to \$5,000 and supports preservation planning and educational projects. The next deadline is June 1.
