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Office of History and Archaeology news

Alaska Maritime Heritage Program

CLG grants

Alaska's fifteen Certified Local Governments received notification that the CLG historic preservation grant program is open to receive grant proposals. The Office of History & Archaeology anticipates \$150,000 will be available to award to eligible projects. The maximum

federal share is \$50,000, with a 60/40 match. The application deadline is 3:00 pm on October 13, 2023. All projects would need to be completed by December 15, 2024.

AHRS-IBS Retirement

The current AHRS-IBS database will be retired on August 31, 2023. The security software used by the AHRS-IBS is not being renewed. AHRS Users who have not already done so will need to create accounts in the AHRSPortal. All AHRS Users, including state employees, will need to go through the sign-up process. You will either log in with a myAlaska account (all non-state employees) or your state id and password (state employees only).

myAlaska Account

All non-state employees will access the AHRSPortal through myAlaska accounts. myAlaska is an independent state program that serves as a gateway to several online state services. The AHRSPortal will essentially be one of those services. You can review the various links and sign up for a myAlaska account at <https://my.alaska.gov/>.

While creating a myAlaska account, please familiarize yourself with the myAlaska privacy policies, user agreements, and create/ identify a myAlaska account for use. New myAlaska accounts with your “business” email are recommended but not required. Note that signing up for a myAlaska account and creating an AHRSPortal account are two different steps. However, you must have a myAlaska account (for non-state employees) before creating an AHRSPortal account.

AHRSPortal Sign-Up

All current AHRS-IBS users should sign up (if you have not already done so) for AHRSPortal Access at <https://dnr.alaska.gov/ahrportal>. Signing up now will allow the AHRS Staff to work through setting up accounts as time permits over the next few months. As stated above, users will need a myAlaska account (State of Alaska employees use current State id and password). Please locate and have ready your current AHRS User Agreement form as well.

Historic Preservation Training

OHA is cooperating with the National Preservation Institute to bring in-person training to Anchorage. Federal Legislation news

The Historic Preservation Fund Program authorization expires September 30, 2023. The bipartisan **Historic Preservation Fund Reauthorization Act** (H.R.3350), reauthorizes the HPF for 10 years and increases the annual authorization from \$150 million to \$250 million. The [Advisory Council on Historic Preservation](#) (ACHP), an independent federal agency tasked with advising the President and Congress on historic preservation issues, sent a [letter](#) to congressional leaders in support of the Historic Preservation Fund Reauthorization Act ([H.R. 3350](#)).

The current Senate Interior bill includes a provision for a 1-year extension reauthorizing the Historic Preservation Fund. Should this provision remain intact, the program would be reauthorized until September 30th, 2024 at the current funding level of \$150 million. The Senate proposal outlines FY24 funding in the amount of \$195,166,000 for the Historic Preservation Fund. It proposes funding level with FY23 enacted levels for both SHPO and THPO offices [SHPO \$62.150 million and THPO \$23 million, respectively]. The Senate has also proposed congressionally directed spending in the amount of \$19.766 million (a \$9.349 million decrease from enacted FY23 levels). Competitive grant programs are also proposed to remain at level funding, as follows: Save America's Treasures \$26.5 million; African American Civil Rights \$24 million; Bruhn \$12.5 million; HBCU \$11 million; Semiquincentennial \$10 million; Civil Rights All Americans \$5 million; Underrepresented Communities \$1.250 million.

If Congress is unable to pass all 12 appropriations bills by January 1, 2024 – a 1% across the board cut would be triggered. This provision was laid out in the debt limit compromise. Historic Tax Credit Growth and Opportunity Act (HTC-GO) (H.R. 1785/S.639) has garnered 28 House co-sponsors and 9 Senate co-sponsors. Ongoing Congressional negotiations continue.

Dept of Interior news

Secretary of Interior Standards

Recent efforts have been undertaken to examine the *Secretary of the Interior Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties*. Of particular interest to historic preservation work is the application and interpretation of those standards and whether treatment outlined for historic properties remains in line with current goals in our field.

The *Secretary of the Interior Professional Qualifications Standards* are similarly undergoing review for potential revision.

The Department of the Interior's Office of Acquisition and Property Management [announces its work](#) to revise the Secretary of the Interior Professional Qualifications Standards. The latest version was published in 1983, though revisions were proposed in 1997, but not finalized. *The Secretary of the Interior's Professional Qualification Standards describe in terms of academic attainment, training, and experience minimum professional standards for a number of professional disciplines routinely practicing in historic preservation today.*

National Park Service news

NPS Grant opportunities:

The National Park Service's **African American Civil Rights (AACR) Grant Program** is now accepting applications. The goal of the AACR Program is to preserve and protect sites associated with the long struggle for equality from the transatlantic slave trade forward. These grants fund a broad range of preservation projects including physical preservation of historic structures, pre-preservation planning, National Register nominations, oral histories, education and interpretation.

This program is administered by the National Park Service. Congress has appropriated \$24,000,000 for this grant program in Fiscal Year 2023. Applications are due October 10, 2023. All applications must be made through Grants.gov. No paper applications will be accepted. Registration in Grants.gov, SAM.gov, and other federal systems can take up to four weeks, so please start early.

Advisory Council on Historic Preservation news

President Biden appointed three new members to the Advisory Council of Historic Preservation. Chair Sara Bronin administered the oath of office to new members: Governor Member John Carney of Delaware, term ending June 2025, and Expert Members, Frank G. Matero of Delaware and Charles L. Ward III, of California, terms ending June 2027.

The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) is now recruiting for the position of Equity Officer (GG-14) in Washington, DC. The ACHP is an independent federal agency that promotes the preservation, enhancement, and sustainable use of our nation's diverse historic resources, and advises the President and the Congress on national historic preservation policy.

The Equity Officer is an important new position in the ACHP's Office of Policy and Legislative Affairs. The Equity Officer will provide advice and assistance to the ACHP regarding equity and environmental justice issues as the agency works to promote the preservation of historic properties, particularly in non-tribal underserved communities. They also will help the ACHP in ensuring diversity and equity in the ACHP workplace. Applicants must have diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility expertise. Knowledge of cultural resources and historic preservation would be beneficial, though not required.

National Trust Preservation Funds Grant Program: Accepting Applications

The next round of the National Preservation Fund is now open. Enhance your efforts to save the historic places within our community—participate in the National Trust Preservation Funds grant program. This annual program supports local preservation organizations' efforts to **preserve**

and protect important places in their communities. Funding ranges from **\$2,500 to \$5,000** and supports **preservation planning and educational projects**. The next **deadline is October 1**.
