2024 OHA/SHPO Workshop

OHA/SHPO is hosting an <u>in-person</u>, all-day workshop at the BP Energy Center, Anchorage, AK on April 5, 2024. It will be the first in-person workshop since 2019. Federal Legislation news

A recently passed Continuing Resolution (CR) funds the federal government through March 1 and March 8.

The <u>FY24 House Interior Appropriations bill</u>, which passed the House in November, included \$175.4 million for the Historic Preservation Fund (HPF), a nearly \$30 million cut below current enacted levels. While the <u>FY24 Senate Interior Appropriations bill</u> included \$195.166 for the HPF and 1 year authorization for the HPF. Both bills included level funding for SHPOs, THPOs and grant programs, but the House bill eliminated congressionally directed spending in the HPF.

White House news

White House to Host Listening Sessions on New American Climate Corp, which was created last fall to prioritize clean energy and conservation. The <u>American Climate Corps</u>, "a groundbreaking workforce training and service initiative that will prepare tens of thousands of young people for good-paying jobs in the clean economy". There is a possibility the Corps could be used to protect cultural resources from climate change threats. Virtual listening sessions are being held January 11th, 16th, and 25th as well as February 1st. <u>Register for a listening session here</u>. The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) announced its adoption of a policy statement on housing and historic preservation that advances a multi-pronged strategy, at all levels of government, to encourage rehabilitation of historic buildings for housing and accelerate permitting and environmental review. ACHP/HUD Secretary's Award for Excellence – deadline extended

The deadline for the 2024 ACHP/HUD Secretary's Award for Excellence in Historic Preservation is now February 7, 2024. This joint award honors outstanding projects that have advanced the goals of historic preservation while promoting affordable housing, community revitalization, and/or enhanced economic opportunities for low- and moderate-income families and individuals.

National Trust/ACHP Award for Federal Partnerships in Historic Preservation

The deadline for nominations for the National Trust/ACHP Award for Federal Partnerships in Historic Preservation is Friday, January 26, 2024. The National Trust/Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP) Award honors outstanding partnerships that advance the preservation of important historic resources and have an impact on the community. It celebrates a project or program in which a federal agency and one or more nonfederal partners have achieved an exemplary preservation outcome. The entire application is completed online (by 11:59 p.m. January 26, 2024, in the local time zone).

National Historical Publications and Records Commission - NHPRC

Congress established the NHPRC grants program to promote the preservation and use of America's documentary heritage.

Each year, Congress appropriates up to \$10 million for grants:

- in support of the nation's archives
- for projects to edit and publish historical records of national importance

The NHPRC supports projects to:

- research and develop means to preserve authentic electronic records
- assist archives through a network of state partners
- preserve and make accessible records and archives
- publish papers documenting America's founding era
- publish papers documenting other eras and topics important to an understanding of American history
- improve professional education for archivists and historical documentary editors

Grant Opportunity:

Major Collaborative Archival Initiatives

For collaborative projects that will significantly improve public discovery and use of major historical records collections.

Archives Collaboratives

For projects to plan and develop a working collaborative designed to enhance the capacity of small and diverse organizations with historical records collections.

State Board Programming Grants

For projects that strengthen the nation's archival network through activities undertaken by state historical records advisory boards.

Publishing Historical Records in Collaborative Digital Editions

For projects to publish documentary editions of historical records. This program has two application cycles.

National Trust Preservation Funds Grant Program: Accepting Applications

The National Trust invites you to save the historic places within our community and participate in the National Trust Preservation Funds grant program. This annual program supports local preservation organizations' efforts to **preserve and protect** important places in their communities.

Funding ranges from \$2,500 to \$5,000 and supports preservation planning and educational projects. The next deadline is Feb 1.

Grant projects have included engineering and architectural consulting services; tours that are accessible via smart devices; and market studies to assist in prioritizing preservation objectives. The National Fund for Sacred Places provides training, planning grants, technical assistance, capacity-building support, and capital grants up to \$500,000 to community-serving congregations across America. Apply for funding by **Feb 29.**

Peter H. Brink Leadership Fund grants (up to \$2,500) for travel costs and mentor honoraria are available for Organization Level Forum or Main Street America members of the National Trust. The purpose of these grants is to support the leadership and effectiveness of staff and board members of preservation organizations through individualized mentoring and the sharing of expertise.
